Q37. Explain the origin and spread of the Non-Cooperation Movement.

Introduction:

The Non-Cooperation Movement was started by Mahatma Gandhi in 1920 against British rule. It became the first mass movement of the Indian freedom struggle.

Origin/Causes:

1. The British government passed the repressive Rowlatt Act.
2. The Jallianwala Bagh massacre angered Indians.
3. The Khilafat issue united Hindus and Muslims against the British.

Spread of the Movement:

1. People boycotted foreign goods and British institutions.
2. Students left government schools and colleges.
3. Lawyers gave up practice in courts.
4. Bonfires of foreign clothes were organized.

Withdrawal:

The movement was withdrawn after the Chauri Chaura incident in 1922.

Importance:

- Political awareness increased among common people.
- National movement became stronger.

Q37 (OR). Discuss the role of the Dandi March in the Indian struggle for independence.

Introduction:

The Dandi March was started by Mahatma Gandhi on 12 March 1930 from Sabarmati Ashram to Dandi.

Role in Freedom Struggle:

1. It was launched against the British Salt Law.
2. Gandhi and his followers walked about 240 miles.
3. Gandhi broke the salt law by making salt at Dandi.
4. The movement spread throughout India.
5. Thousands of people participated in Civil Disobedience Movement.

6. Women also took active participation.

Importance:

- It united Indians against British rule.
- It attracted worldwide attention.
- It weakened the authority of the British government.

Q38. Compare the Northern Plains and the Peninsular Plateau.

Northern Plains:

1. Formed by alluvial deposits of rivers.
2. Flat and fertile land.
3. Suitable for agriculture.
4. Densely populated.
5. Rivers are perennial.

Peninsular Plateau:

1. Made of old hard rocks.
2. Uneven and rocky surface.
3. Rich in minerals.
4. Less densely populated.
5. Rivers are seasonal.

Conclusion:

Northern Plains are important for agriculture while the Peninsular Plateau is important for mineral resources and industries.

Q38 (OR). Describe the Indian Desert and its main features.

Introduction:

The Indian Desert lies towards the western margins of India and is also called the Thar Desert.

Main Features:

1. It receives very low rainfall.
2. The climate is hot and dry.
3. Sand dunes are common.
4. Vegetation is sparse and thorny.
5. Streams appear only during rainy season.
6. Population density is low.

Importance:

- Camel is an important means of transport.
- Irrigation has improved agriculture in some regions.

Conclusion:

The Indian Desert has a unique geographical environment and plays an important role in western India.

Q39. Describe the powers and functions of the Prime Minister of India.

Introduction:

The Prime Minister is the real executive head of India and leader of the Council of Ministers.

Powers and Functions:

1. Forms the Council of Ministers.
2. Distributes portfolios among ministers.
3. Presides over cabinet meetings.
4. Advises the President.
5. Coordinates work of ministries.
6. Represents India internationally.

Importance:

The Prime Minister ensures smooth functioning of the government.

Q39 (OR). Describe the powers and functions of the President of India.

Introduction:

The President is the constitutional head of India.

Powers and Functions:

1. Appoints the Prime Minister and other ministers.
2. Summons and dissolves Parliament.
3. Gives assent to bills.
4. Supreme Commander of Armed Forces.
5. Can declare emergency.
6. Appoints governors, judges and ambassadors.

Importance:

The President safeguards the Constitution and ensures constitutional functioning.
