He had strong faith and asked God for a hundred pesos to sow his field again. He needed the money to support his family until the next harvest. He believed God would assist him in his greatest time of need. (ii) Suggested Value Points: Anne talked a lot, extra homework, an essay on A Chatterbox, a disciplinary action Model Answer: Mr. Keesing was annoyed with Anne because she talked a lot during his math lessons. He assigned her extra homework, asking her to write an essay on the topic "A Chatterbox" to reflect on her talkative nature. This was meant as a disciplinary action to encourage her to speak less in class. (iii) Suggested Value Points: entry musical, sound of his bamboo, cheerful sound, arrival indication Model Answer: The baker's entry was described as 'musical' because of the rhythmic sound made by his bamboo staff as he banged it on	3 X 2 =6

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	the ground while walking. The repeated 'jhang, jhang' sound created a familiar and cheerful tune, announcing his arrival to the village each day. (iv)Suggested Value Points: calls in a playful tone, she acts with confidence, behaves like a grown-up, Model Answer: The conductor refers to Valli as 'madam' playfully because she acts with confidence and independence, just like an adult. Even though she is a young child, Valli speaks and behaves as though she is grown-up. The conductor humorously respects her self-assured attitude by calling her 'madam.'

Suggested Value Points: Many changes in his perception, enjoyed freedom in as a child, later realised apartheid, expanded his view, not personal but freedom of people, justice for all regardless of race, dedicated his life to country Model Answer: Nelson Mandela's perception of freedom underwent significant changes from his childhood to his young adult years. As a child, Mandela experienced freedom through the simple joys of rural life in his village, where he could play and roam freely in the fields near his home. His early life was relatively untouched by the harsh realities of apartheid. However, as Mandela grew older, he encountered the oppressive system of apartheid that limited the freedoms of black South Africans in profound and systemic ways. This exposure to racial discrimination and injustice expanded his view of freedom. It was no longer just about personal liberty but included the broader, collective freedom of his people. Mandela's understanding evolved to see freedom as a comprehensive right. He recognised that true freedom meant not only the absence of physical constraints but also equality, justice and human dignity for all individuals, regardless of their race. This matured perspective motivated him to become actively involved in the anti-apartheid movement. He dedicated his life to fighting for a free and democratic South	3X2=6

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9.	Africa where everyone could enjoy the freedoms that he had once taken for granted as a child. OR Suggested Value Points: comes to Buddha for help, Change in Gotami's understanding of life and death, task to collect mustard seeds, a house no one has died, unable to find such a family, realises the inevitability of death, Model Answer: Buddha brings about a different perspective in Kisa Gotami's understanding of life by guiding her to discover the universal nature of death and suffering. Instead of directly telling her that death is inevitable, he gives her the task to collect mustard seeds from a house where no one has experienced loss. This approach helps her realise on her own that every family has faced death showing her that grief and loss are shared by all. This personal journey changes her perspective from focusing solely on her own pain to understanding that death is a part of the natural cycle of life. Buddha's method of teaching helps Kisa Gotami move beyond her attachment to her son and her selfish grief. She learns to accept the impermanence of life and finds peace in the realisation that death is inevitable for everyone, which brings her a deeper understanding of life's realities. (i) Suggested Value Points: Fire symbolises desire, ice symbol of hatred, emotions can lead to destruction Model Answer: The message of the poem 'Fire and Ice' is that emotions, when left unchecked can lead to swift destruction. Here, fire symbolizes burning desire, passion and ambition. Ice represents cold hatred, indifference and emotional detachment. The poet emphasises the universality of these emotions and their potential to cause destruction. (ii) Suggested Value Points: hugs very hard, fatal attack not a friendly embrace, humorous description Model Answer: A bear hugs a person very hard. In reality, a bear's tight grip is a crushing, fatal attack meant to overpower its prey. The poem humorously treats this deadly physical violence as a friendly embrace, suggesting that the bear will keep hugging its victim until they are dead. (iii) Suggested Value Points: trees break free from house, move into open night, celebration of freedom Model Answer: The trees successfully break free from the house and move into the open night. They escape confinement by shattering the triumph over restrictions. The scattered moonlight and winds greeting the trees reflect a celebration of freedom and renewal. (iv) Suggested Value Points: only divine love is unconditional, human love superficial, limitations of human affection Model Answer: The speaker mentions God to show that only divine love is truly unconditional. While humans often love based on looks, the speaker suggests that only God can see past outward	3X2=6

(i)Suggested Value Points: simple diet and exercise, no food and medicine, regains health Model Answer: Mr. Herriot treats Tricki by giving him a simple diet and plenty of exercise with other dogs. He avoids rich foods and medicine, allowing Tricki to recover through a balanced routine. This approach helps Tricki regain his health naturally. (ii)Suggested Value Points: a typical thief, likes rare and expensive books, steals each year to purchase books Model Answer: Horace Danby is a typical thief. He likes to collect rare and expensive books He steals each year to earn enough money to buy the rare books that he loves. (iii)Suggested Value Points: behaves strangely, no interaction with people, bandages all over face Model Answer: Mrs. Hall finds the scientist eccentric because he behaves strangely, avoids people, and does not want to interact. He stays locked in his room, wears bandages all over his face and refuses to explain his odd appearance or actions. (iv)Suggested Value Points: necklace fake, sacrifice not necessary, shocked to know the fact Model Answer: Matilda was shocked to find that the necklace was a fake and worth only a few hundred francs. This fact meant that her years of hardship and sacrifice to replace the lost necklace were unnecessary and could have been avoided.	3X2=6

Suggested Value Points: Title appropriate, midnight visitor Max sneaks into room with pistol, another visitor-the waiter with drinks, Ausable shows presence of mind, police at the door, Max dies, midnight visitor's entry triggers the conflict Model Answer: The title of Robert Arthur's short story "The Midnight Visitor" is highly appropriate. The entire plot hinges on a surprise intrusion that occurs in the dead of night. Max, a rival secret agent, sneaks into Ausable's hotel room and waits in the dark with a pistol to steal top-secret reports. This "midnight visitor" triggers the entire conflict of the story. By the end of the story, the title doesn't just refer to Max . It also points to a second "visitor"—the waiter, Henry, who knocks on the door at the exact right moment to deliver Ausable's drinks. Ausable brilliantly uses the timing of this midnight knock to convince Max that the police are at the door. As a result, Max leaps out of the window to his death. Thus, the title is justified because it accurately describes the central plot twist. It cleverly refers to both the threat (Max) and the savior (Henry) who appear in the room around midnight. OR Suggested Value Points: Bholi transformation owes to her teacher, terrified on the first day, teacher behaves kindly, reassures her to overcome her fears, consistently supports her, instills in her a sense of self-worth, becomes a confident girl Model Answer: Bholi's transformation from a timid, stammering girl into the confident Sulekha owes much to the encouragement of her teacher. On her first day at school, Bholi felt terrified and out of place. However, her teacher's kind and patient approach changed everything. She spoke to Bholi in a comforting tone.	6
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	She reassured Bholi that she was capable of learning and overcoming her fears. The teacher's gentle encouragement gave Bholi the courage to try speaking without fear of being mocked. Over time, this consistent support developed Bholi's self-esteem and allowed her to see herself in a new light. By nurturing Bholi's potential and emphasising the importance of education, the teacher instilled in her a sense of self-worth. This would become essential later when Bholi stood up against Bishamber's greed. This shows that a supportive teacher can greatly impact a child's life.	
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
